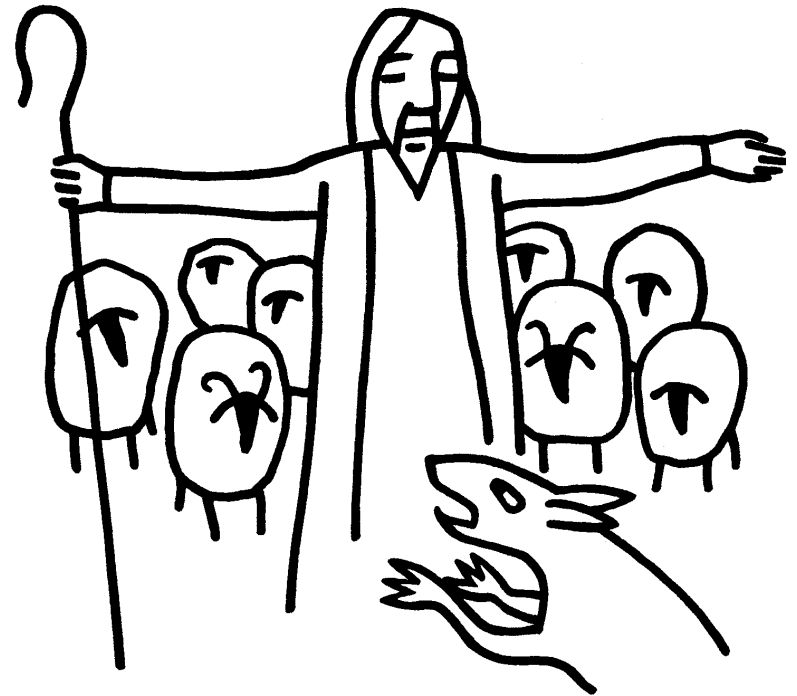

COMMEMORATIONS FOR THE WEEK

Monday, May 4, 2009

Monica, mother of Augustine, died 387

Monica was married to a pagan husband who was ill-tempered and unfaithful, but whom she helped bring into the Christian faith. She repeated the influence on her son Augustine, who went on to become one of the greatest church teachers.

Friday, May 8

Julian of Norwich, renewer of the church, died around 1416

When she was about thirty years old, Julian (or Juliana) reported visions that she later compiled into a book, Sixteen Revelations of Divine Love, now a classic of medieval mysticism. The visions declared that love was the meaning of religious experience, provided by Christ who is love, for the purpose of love.

Friday, May 8

Victor the Moor, martyr, died 303 (TFF)

Also known as Victor Maurus, this native of the northwest African nation of Mauritania was a soldier in the Roman Praetorian Guard. Under the persecution of Maximian, Victor died for his faith at Milan.

Lay your head on my pillow...

Starting the First Sunday in May we will be Commencing The Monthly Giving Program to benefit Refugee families serviced by LSS. As you know, these new Americans come to New Hampshire with hopes and dreams for a new start in a safe welcoming environment. However, the necessities of daily living, which we all are so lucky to have and likely not even notice become ever more important. Each month we will be collecting basic household and personal care items to be distributed to local Refugee families.



May is pillow month, there will be a playpen in the entryway to collect our donations. Our congregation will be sending a group to Synod Assembly at the end of the month and they will be presenting our pillows at that time.

Gift cards to Walmart aren't as big or fluffy but they are just as appreciated!

June 7 begins our one-worship service schedule, 9:00 am only. This is also the date for our congregational meeting.

MAKE IT A 3-D WORLD...

Remember how exciting those 3-D movies were! Talk about “Reach out and touch someone”..you felt you were there in those movies with the lion jumping out at you or you on a rocket riveting into outer space. The world has changed in the last 50 years and so have those “special effects” in movies, but our foreign aid system is still stuck in the past. Currently our government’s global development policies and programs are scattered across 12 department, 25 different agencies, and nearly 60 government offices. A more efficient foreign assistance system—with better coordination, better accountability, better clarity—means that people get faster and more effective help. A streamlined process will increase the value, impact, and transparency of U.S. international development investments. Bread for the World’s Offering of Letters is asking our members of Congress to reform foreign assistance which means **less waste and better value** at a time when our government leaders must make hard economic choices. Effective foreign assistance creates more stability and lasting solutions to the difficult problems our world faces.

However, let’s not forget how real the 3-D movies were to us where we were actively part of the plot. MAKE IT A 3-D WORLD where DEVELOPMENT aid is as important as DIPLOMACY AND DEFENSE and again people will actively be a part of the change in their own lives. A holistic plan for foreign aid needs to include self sufficiency for individuals and ownership by the country receiving the aid. After providing foreign aid to fight AIDS and malaria for a woman in Kenya, let’s give a **hand-up** so she can learn new skills and get started on a small business that will lead to self-sufficiency. Let’s partner with organizations within a country so that an NGO (nongovernmental organization like LWR) which taught a Nicaraguan man how to make organic fertilizer for growing coffee can follow through in getting land from a land bank project so he can plant a coffee farm and see those plants mature. Consulting with local communities can help expand the focus of foreign aid so that people can lift themselves out of poverty.

It’s just as exciting to *foster* lasting peace and prosperity in a **real** world by focusing U.S. foreign assistance on global development as it was to see those 3-D movies of the **reel** world, a bit behind the times now.

Join us for Adult Forum at 9:15 on May 10th to explore together how the “Parable of the Sower” speaks to the need for reforming foreign assistance in order to more effectively reduce hunger and poverty around the world.

Write a letter on **May 10th** or **17th** at our Letter writing Stations and let our members of Congress know we want to MAKE IT A 3-D WORLD where development joins with diplomacy and defense to help **real** people provide a better life for their children.
